TOWN OF BASS LAKE QUESTIONNAIRE- ATV Routes

This month the Town of Bass Lake sent out a survey with property tax bills to all property owners. We do encourage everyone to complete the survey and make your opinions known.

One of the questions asks about ATV use in the Township. As a refresher, a couple of years ago the Town was looking at expanding the use of some of the Town roads as ATV routes. We expressed that we did not wish to see Williams Road and Highline Road be designated as ATV routes due to the many hidden driveways and windiness and hilliness of these roads. The Town did partially remove Highline Road between Williams and Highway K from the proposal. Those of us who worked on the project advocate for increased off-road ATV routes to maximize safety from potential car/bicycle/human and ATV collisions. Keep in mind that ATVs and UTVs can operate at car-like speeds, but do not have the same level of safety equipment nor insurance as are required for cars and trucks.

At the current time, our property owners along Highline Road and those of us who worked on the project 2 years ago ask that as you express your opinions, please consider to NOT select that all Town Roads be included as ATV routes. We think it would be safest to consider each road, its traffic level and terrain before considering adding a road as an ATV route.

LAKE LEVEL SURVEY

As we approach the end of a very turbulent year, we sincerely hope that all of you had a wonderful summer and fall and that your families were able to find a little sanctuary on our lakes. With summer still a recent memory, we thought now might be a good time to discuss our high water levels and their impact.

As most of you are aware, the level of our lakes has been rising for the last few years. There is a general consensus among long-time Windigo property owners that the lake level this summer was the highest they have seen. While highs and lows can be cyclical, and the fall weather gave us some level reduction, there is little reason to think that these high water levels will substantially subside anytime soon.

Unfortunately, the high water levels on Windigo are resulting in some very negative consequences including shoreline erosion, the toppling and death of vegetation including heirloom/legacy trees due to root saturation and threat to some lake homes. Although not the only contributor, we do know that boat wakes and waves in combination with the high water are exacerbating the situation.

Other lakes in the area have been similarly affected, including reports of damage to homes and personal property. Two of these lakes in particular, Perch Lake and Stone Lake, are taking individual efforts at abatement. Perch Lake is petitioning the DNR to lower the lake level. Stone Lake is pursuing its association members to take voluntary actions.

So what actions can our community take to help mitigate at least some of these negative consequences or long lasting affects? Because we are a seepage type lake with no outlet, it is not feasible to reduce the

water level in any meaningful way and certainly not in the near term.

Some of the easiest things we can do include:

- Watch your boat and PWC
 (personal water craft) wakes and, at a minimum, comply with DNR No Wake Ordinances.
- 2) Encourage others seen violating these ordinances to comply.
- 3) Post "High Water Alert" signs on your docks. These are available from Steve and Kris Soegaard at soegie1@centurylink.net if you are interested in putting on your docks next spring. (We realize that the

- signs are difficult to read from a distance. The hope is that if boaters read one and then see a proliferation of the signs around the lake they will understand that this is a community effort and may be more responsive.)
- 4) Move wake generating activities (high speed boating, tubing, water skiing, and jet skiing) to the center of lake in areas of most open water far from the shore.
- Be mindful that we are a small lake and that wakes and waves even in the center of the lake or open water don't, in many cases, have time to dissipate significantly before impacting the shore.
- 6) Inform/educate your guests and renters of our high water issues and ensure that they are aware of Wisconsin boating regulations as they pertain to wakes. Maybe post DNR Ordinances in your home for reference.
- 7) Make your neighbors that are not members of the Association aware of our water level issues and our abatement efforts.

In addition to the above, we created a survey for Association members to complete in an effort to determine the level of concern with the water level. Additionally, this information may help us identify what steps we as an association, as well as individual lake shore owners, might be willing to take to help mitigate the above. To that end, we ask that you complete the online survey to help us understand your views on this topic.

Additionally, if you are aware of any areas that are exhibiting erosion or undercutting, please contact Steve Soegaard at soegie1@centurylink.net. The Township of Bass Lake has indicated some willingness to maybe supply and install riprap/stone in particularly threatened areas.

Your thoughts, suggestions, comments, and recommendations, on this or on any matters relating to the lake and its wellbeing are encouraged.


TREASURER REPORT

WLPOA's income through September 30, 2020 is summarized below:

- We have received \$2,110.00 in dues from members.
- Donations to the Fish Management Fund totaled \$1,272.50.
- Donations to the Invasive Species Fund totaled \$1,472.50.

We are very grateful to all of our members for their continued support of WLPOA. As in previous years, we received some very generous donations to our Fish Management Fund and Invasive Species Fund. Thank you!





WLPOA was awarded another DNR Clean Boats Clean Water Grant for 2020. WLPOA uses this grant to fund the monitoring of our boat landing.

The grant is 75% funded by the DNR with a 25% match provided by WLPOA. There is a \$3,000 cap on the amount that the DNR will spend each year. Our match can be satisfied with cash or by supplying "in-kind" donations of volunteer labor. Donated labor must be related to boat landing monitoring and cannot include time donated toward AIS monitoring or other activities beneficial to Windigo.

We received the usual advance of \$750 earlier in the year. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 not much activity occurred that we could use for the grant. We were not able to make contact with our boat landing monitor and unable to identify another person for that job.

LAKE ENVIRONMENT – Clean Boats Clean Water (CBCW) Boat Landing Monitoring Colleen Graham

WLPOA applied for and received a grant for the CBCW program for 2020. However, the DNR suspended the program at the end of March due to safety and health restrictions related to COVID-19. They restarted the program this summer, but we were unable to hire a monitor mid-season. The DNR grant will be rolled over to 2021 and we plan to get a monitor hired for next spring.

FISH AND WILDLIFE COMMITTEE

The WLPOA Fish and Wildlife Committee would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a healthy and happy New Year!

The WDNR was scheduled to implement a Fyke net study this last spring but the Covid 19 pandemic forced a cancellation of all their surveys for the year. They did manage to complete a shock survey in October, 2020 with the focus on Walleye recruitment (reproduction) from the spring. The survey showed a significant decline in Walleye fingerlings from the spring spawning period. This is the first time in a number of years that the reproduction was down but there are many factors that may have altered the survey. Although the WDNR Fish Biologist is not overly concerned at this point, they told me that negative survey results do happen. It is also a very possible sign of overfishing, something that Windigo has been experiencing over the last few years.

The WDNR is not planning on any surveys this coming year as they are trying to play catch up with the surveys that they didn't get to complete last year. They are tentatively planning on doing a "All Species" survey in 2022.

I would also like to ask residents to help us keep a watchful eye for any suspicious activity by fisherman on our lake. There have been more reports of over the limit problems and we need to call the WDNR to curtail this type of behavior.

Please remember to "Catch and Release". It is not easy letting a nice fish go, but it is the only way to help our fishery survive. Please feel free to call or email if you have any questions or ideas. (See contact information at the end of this newsletter.)

This fall was active with waterfowl this fall. We had broods of wood ducks, mallard ducks, merganzers, and buffleheads until they migrated to warmer winter homes.

Ermine were also spotted frolicking this fall. Eagles have been soaring around the eastern side of Windigo and on/near the island with the old nest.



CONTOURED MAP


