TREASURER REPORT

Member Dues Drive

WLPOA's annual income from Member Dues through December 30, 2022 is summarized below:

- We received a total of \$4,085 in member contributions, which consisted of the following:
- \$2,000 in dues from members.
- Donations to the Fish Management Fund in the amount of \$875.
- Donations to the Invasive Species Fund in the amount of \$935.
- Undesignated donations of \$25.00.
- Donations to Friends of Windigo of \$125.
- Contributions for 2022 were less than those received in 2021 (\$4,830).

We are grateful to all of our members for their continued support of WLPOA. Thank you!

Expenses

WLPOA had expenses of \$3,931.82 for calendar year 2022.

DNR Clean Boats Clean Water Grant

We applied for a 2022 Clean Boats Clean Water Grant from the DNR and the grant request was approved. We received an advance payment in the amount of \$750 in early 2022. However, our historical landing monitor was not available to

work for us this past summer. In addition, Colleen Graham, who has managed this program for many years, resigned from her position on the board at the end of last year. We were unable to recruit a landing monitor and to date, we do not yet have a new property owner volunteer to fill this position. Therefore, we were unable to perform the tasks required of the grant. The \$750 advance will be returned to the DNR.



As of December 30, 2022, WLPOA had the following account balances. The balances reflect the transfer of 2022 member donations to the Fish Management Reserve and the Invasive Species Reserve from the General Fund (Checking).

Clean boats, Clean Waters Grant


As Kris noted in our Treasurer report, WLPOA had previously been approved for a Clean Boats, Clean Waters grant for many years which we used to help to pay for most of our boat landing monitor costs. The landing was staffed on most weekends and holidays from fishing opener through Labor Day. We have had to suspend our boat landing monitoring and participation in this program because we need a volunteer to help with the grant application, hiring of the monitor and reporting of the data gathered. Decontamination Stations

Sawyer County recently passed an ordinance regarding decontamination stations at boat landings. The ordinance doesn't require the stations to be installed; however, if a decontamination station is available and stocked, it must be used to clean the vessel before entering and exiting the waterbody. Failure to use the station could result in a warning followed by fines for repeated offenses. Washburn, Bayfield, and Ashland counties already passed similar ordinances. Dan Lew has been working with the DNR and the Town of Bass Lake. He also has researched the existing station at Whitefish Lake for planning and specifying the installation of a decontamination station at the Windigo boat landing. The WLPOA Board will be reviewing and working with Dan this Spring to plan next steps. Thanks Dan for all of your work on this project!

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Watch

Thanks to everyone for your continued interest and vigilance in looking for Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)! As a reminder, there are 2 major plant AIS that are prevalent in other area lakes and which we are working to keep out of Windigo: Curly Leaf Pond Weed and Eurasian Water-Milfoil.



Look for Curly Leaf Pondweed from Ice-Out through June

As soon as ice is off our lakes, it's time to look for Curly Leaf Pondweed (CLP), an underwater plant that usually grows in lake water 3 to 10 feet deep. CLP grows well in cold temperatures, even under the ice. Since it's already growing at ice-out, it can shade out smaller native plants and form dense mats that make it tough to boat or swim. When curly-leaf pondweed dies back in mid-summer, it releases nutrients that can fuel algae blooms and cause other problems. It is easily spread by boats and trailers.

Chinese Mystery Snails Found in Windigo

Dan Lew brought some largish snails that he found to the Annual Picnic last August and sent pictures to the DNR for evaluation as requested after we contacted Max Wolter. One of the pictures is to the right. Scott Van Egeren, who is a water resources expert at the DNR confirmed that the snails did look like Chinese Mystery Snails. This will be the first invasive species that has been found in Windigo. There is no known effective way to get rid of them once found in a lake.

FISH AND WILDLIFE COMMITTEE

Greetings!

There were several homeowners who contacted me after seeing a DNR shock boat this fall. I contacted Max Wolter (DNR Fish Biologist) to confirm if there was an actual survey taken. He confirmed that it did happen and we discussed the results. Many factors are involved with the processing of the data from the study, but it did show a decline in Walleye



reproduction from the previous years. Without any more studies that would target the adult fish population (Fyke netting in the spring) it is hard to determine the health of the fish population in Windigo. The fishing pressure is heavy, and coupled with the recent data from the shock survey suggests a decline in adult Walleye and Largemouth Bass. More surveys are needed to determine more accurate population estimates.

This latest survey supports the theory of the slow decline in our fish population, making catch and release a very important tool in keeping our fishery healthy.

Social Chair: Coordinate the Annual Meeting/Picnic and Spring Dinner.


