TREASURER'S REPORT

WLPOA's income through June 15, 2022 is summarized below:

We have received a total of \$5,997 in member contributions to date. As of June 15, 2022, WLPOA had the following account balances.

We are grateful to all of our members for their continued support of WLPOA.

For many past years, WLPOA has been awarded a DNR Clean Boats Clean Water Grant. WLPOA uses this grant to fund the monitoring of our boat landing. The grant is 75% funded by the DNR with a 25% match provided by WLPOA. There is a \$3,000 cap on the amount that the DNR will spend each year. Our match can be satisfied with cash or by supplying "in-kind" donations of volunteer labor. Donated labor must be related to boat landing monitoring and <u>cannot</u> include time donated toward AIS monitoring or other activities beneficial to Windigo.

This year, we have been unable to hire a boat landing monitor so we will need to return the advanced funds. To continue getting this grant in the future, we desperately need a volunteer to take over the Lake Environment job from Colleen Graham. Colleen will help the new volunteer with the grant application this fall.

LAKE ENVIRONMENT

Thanks to everyone for your continued interest and vigilance in looking for Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)! As a reminder, there are 2 major AIS that are prevalent in other area lakes and which we are working to keep out of Windigo: Curly Leaf Pond Weed and Eurasian Water-Milfoil.

Summer is the time to look for Eurasian Milfoil

Eurasian watermilfoil is visible throughout summer. Plants usually extend 3 to 10 feet, but can reach as much as 33 feet in length. The stems are reddish-brown to whitish-pink. It forms dense mats on the surface of water bodies, and new plants may emerge from each node on a stem root on contact with mud. It regenerates mostly from rhizomes, fragmented stems, and axillary buds that develop throughout the year. Clean Boats Clean Water Boat Landing Monitoring

As reported earlier this year, we did receive another CBCW grant for boat landing monitoring. However, our previous monitor, Dennis, was not available this summer to monitor on weekends and our

attempts to hire someone else have not been successful. So we have been unable to use our grant. We hope that we can get the program going again in 2023 and that we can get a grant even though we did not use our grant this year. Also, as previously discussed, we need a new volunteer leader for this role after this year.

FISHING AND WILDLIFE COMMITTEE UPDATES

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources completed a study that was designed to estimate the crappie population this spring. I had the pleasure of accompanying Max Wolter and crew when they were pulling the Fyke nets used to capture fish for the study. The pace was fast, as the crew had another lake to go to in the afternoon, but the experience was very interesting. The Fyke net is a large tube-like net with steel rings holding it in a long circular shape. There is a larger capture area at the end that the fish swim to and can't escape. When the nets were pulled, the fish were scooped out with a hand net and placed in a large tub filled with water in the middle of the boat. Once the net was empty and stored on the boat, the fish were taken one by one out of the tub and measured. This data was being entered immediately into the computer database by Max. Eurasian Water-Milfoil (Myriophyllum spicatum)

Practice CPR <u>Catch, Photo, Release</u> our lake depends on it!

Catch And Release Responsibly: It Will Grow On Youl Fish you wish to release, and fish not meeting the legal length limit, should be played as fittle as possible and handled carfellily with wet hands. The fish should not be held out of the water longer than necessary to remove hooks, take a photograph, or measure the fish. If live release is intended, a quick-strike rig should be employed, where the hook is set immediately when a fish strikes to prevent deeply hooked fish. Deep-hooked fish, if meeting the legal limit, should be kept, on the most heigh legal length limit it must be let go after cutting the line or leader as close to the hook as possible. The process was amazing and the number of crappies was very good. It was a direct result of the 5-15 rule put into effect a few years ago. Walleyes were few, and this parallels the data that although they are of decent size, they are not very abundant in our lake. Largemouth bass continue to decline because of heavy fishing pressure.

Please remember to catch and release, especially bigger fish that are the breeding stock for next year. A photo of the fish is all you need!

I would also like to mention the major contributions that Colleen Graham has given this community over the years. Her work and efforts to better this lake has been greatly appreciated. Thanks Colleen!

SHORELINE AND BOATING UPDATES

Thankfully, the water levels have subsided this year. Even though extreme shoreline damage has lessened, it is still nice that boaters have been keeping higher speeds away from the shore. This really enhances protecting the shore and enables safety of shore-hugging wildlife, swimmers, floaters, and others who enjoy fewer waves near their property.

Here are a few boating reminders:

- Please make sure that you and your guests know the Wisconsin laws for boating. You can download the Wisconsin DNR handbook at this link: https://widnr.widen.net/s/0vw8hwrae3.
- 2) As a reminder there is a Bass Lake Ordinance that classifies <u>the entirety of Portage Bay as a</u> <u>no-wake zone</u>.
- 3) Sawyer County has an ordinance that requires any Wake Boating be done at least 700 feet from shore. Because of Windigo Lake's size and bays, <u>Wake Boating is not allowed at all on any</u> part of Windigo Lake. FYI, Wake Boating is a specific type of boating in which the boat creates a large wave that enables surfing behind it without a rope. It is becoming more popular on large bodies of water.
- 4) Please operate all boats at no-wake speeds on Lake 27 It is a small shallow lake with lots of wildlife and adjacent wetlands.
- 5) Please operate all boats at slow/no-wake speeds in all of the smaller bays on Windigo Lake.

A Few Key DNR Regulations:

As a reminder, here are a few of DNR regulations for all Wisconsin lakes. Boats need to have no wake 100 feet from shore. For personal watercraft (PWC), the no-wake law specifies that they need to be 200 feet from shore before a wake is allowed. PWC also need to slow to no-wake speeds when they are within 100 feet of another boat.

All boats (motorized and non-motorized) should stay clear of the loons. Motorized boats including PWCs, should stay at least 200 feet from any loons.

NEW AIS DECOMTAMINATION LAW AND POTENTIAL WINDIGO PROJECT

In January of this year, the Sawyer County Board of Supervisors passed a law that requires decontamination of all boats entering and exiting any lake in Sawyer County that has a decontamination station at the boat launch. The new law was written up in the February 2, 2022 Sawyer County Record.

Per the article, "The ordinance defines a "decontamination station" as "any device provided at a public or private waterway access to remove

all potential invasive species."

It notes "the station may consist of high temperature water (140 degrees Fahrenheit or more) applied with pressure washer by trained personnel, a recommended chemical solution (such as simple bleach/water 500 ppm solution, i.e. 2 tablespoons bleach per gallon of water) applied with a low-pressure sprayer, or any other acceptable technique as approved and abided by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Best Management Practices or other equivalent policy.""

The article gives the following additional information: "Penalties for a first offense for failing to follow the ordinance would be a warning letter from the county's Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) coordinator. The second offense carries a \$300 fine plus court costs, and for a third and subsequent citation, \$1,000 plus court costs.

Zoning Administrator Jay Kozlowski said the ordinance is for the prevention of AIS that are already present in the county, and other species, such as zebra mussels and spiny water fleas, which are present in neighboring counties."



Another facet of implementing a decontamination station is that because each boat entering and exiting the lake must use it, it would make timely entry of large numbers of boats at one time much more difficult. The

Whitefish Lake Association has implemented signage and a simple tank with bleach solution at their boat landing. The cost to implement a simple system is estimated at under \$5000, mostly for the signage.

A few of us have discussed this concept for Windigo for implementation at the parking lot by our boat landing, but we need a volunteer to lead the implementation of the project. If you are interested in helping out on this project, please contact any WLPOA Board member.

HIGHLINE ROAD ATV ROUTE AND FIRE DEPARTMENT UPDATE

Thanks to everyone who contacted the Bass Lake Board this Spring and Summer regarding Highline Road as an ATV route. Whatever your opinion, engagement with our local government is always good. Highline Road between Williams Road and Highway K had been turned down as an ATV route several times in recent years with the support of many including property owners on the road. Last month with pressure from Sawyer County organizations, the Bass Lake Town Board did approve that section of road as an ATV route last month and signs have been put in place.

Also as an FYI, at the July Bass Lake Town Board Meeting, the long-time volunteer Bass Lake fire chief, Marvin Mullet, was asked to leave his job by the Bass Lake Town Board even though many who attended the meeting voiced strong support for Marv. Following the meeting quite a few firemen have also quit. As an FYI, The Bass Lake Fire Department is a volunteer organization. We thought we should make our property owners aware of the situation because if someone does need the fire department in the near term, the LCO Fire Department or the City of Hayward Fire Department will be the closest departments to help us.

CRITTER REPORTS AND LOON REMINDERS

We have had some notable critter sightings on our lakes this spring so far:

- 1) Bears are around again/still. We have sightings at various spots around our lakes.
- 2) At least one pair of Loons is back on Windigo but we don't think we have any surviving young loons this year. There was a nest in Lake 27 but it was attacked by a predator of some type.
- 3) Great Blue and Green herons has been spotted again.
- 4) We saw Bufflehead and Merganzers earlier this year.
- 5) Some geese and our neighborly deer are also present.

- 6) Eagles have been spotted and we believe the nest location is near Lake 27.
- 7) Beavers were in action last fall and were seen often this winter.
- 8) We have spotted otters again.

Also, as a particular reminder for the benefit of the loons, NON-motorized boats getting too close to nesting areas are a serious threat to loon health. Adult loons can become stressed and will readily abandon a nest when strangers approach. Please stay well clear of the loons with <u>ALL BOATS</u> and use a zoom lens on your camera from a distance if you want to get a picture!

OAK WILT UPDATE

As we discussed last year at our Annual Meeting, Oak Wilt has been increasingly found in Sawyer County and in trees on a few properties on Windigo Lake. Since last year, properties on both the south side and north side of the lake have been found to have Oak Wilt.

Oak Wilt has been in Wisconsin since the 1940s. It is a fungus that gets in the root systems and blocks the ability for water to fuel the tree. It travels thru roots of Oak trees that can spread 100 feet. It can also be spread by beetles that feed on dead Oak bark and then can carry the fungus to other trees. So, the best time to trim Oak Trees is in winter, but sometimes, dead wood can happen other times of the year after thunderstorms and can create risk.

<u>Oak Wilt fungus is fatal to the tree.</u> However there is a preventative treatment that can be injected in uninfected trees every 2 years to prevent the fungus from taking hold. The DNR website has good pictures to help identify Oak Wilt. Oak Wilt starts at the top of the tree. Red Oak are the most

susceptible and White Oak can also get Oak Wilt but are less susceptible. Professional tree services can help with preventive treatments.

SPRING DINNER RECAP

After a 2 year COVID hiatus we had a fun and successful Spring Dinner at Trailways Inn on Saturday April 30th with close to 40 people in attendance. It was great to connect and catch up with fellow property owners in a comfortable social setting with good food! Thanks to everyone who joined us!

Our speaker was Alison Slavik of the American Birkebeiner Foundation. She told us about the Historic Telemark Property Project.

The American Birkebeiner Ski Foundation's mission is to promote and conduct the finest international cross country ski competition; to serve as good stewards of the American Birkebeiner Trail; and to support healthy and active lifestyles among people of all ages and abilities. The Foundation acquires land for conservation purposes to help reach their goals. In a nutshell, the Foundation has a mission to get people outside.

In purchasing the historic Telemark property, they are reaching toward a dream. They have established a conservancy to protect the property's recreation and conservation value forever. They have already received some state grants and have sold some of the land to a land trust as a preserve and 500 acres will be protected for recreation.



Alison gave us a short history of the Telemark property which was originally opened in 1947 by Tony Wise who grew up in the Hayward area and had attended Harvard. He got the idea for the 4-star

Telemark Ski Resort from skiing in the Swiss Alps. He operated it successfully for over 40 years. He led the creation of the Birkebeiner Ski race in 1973. Tony dedicated his life to the Hayward area. He also founded the Lumberjack Championships, was Mayor of Hayward and held numerous community service roles. The Telemark Lodge was lost to bankruptcy in 1984. The Birkebeiner Race was saved by creation of the American Birkebeiner Foundation. After Telemark was closed, the lodge building was quite distressed. Alison noted that the old Telemark lodge could not be saved, but they were able to save the rocks from the massive fireplace and they will be used in a future project at the site. They are continuing to apply for grants and are taking donations to help with the project.
