WLPOA ANNUAL MEETING 8/12/2023

We held our annual meeting on Saturday August 12, 2023 at the home of Dennis and DeAnn Persells. The Annual meeting and picnic this coming summer will again be at the Persells home on Saturday August 10, 2024.

We had lots of good discussion and dialogue during the meeting and after at the picnic. This is a great event to meet your lake neighbors. Thanks to all who came! Topics were:

• <u>Secretary Report:</u> Barb Pjevach had sent out the minutes from last year's annual meeting with the newsletter. The minutes were approved by membership as submitted.

- <u>Treasurer Report:</u> Kris Soegaard reported the WLPOA finances that had been sent out with the most recent newsletter.
- Nominating: As discussed previously, we have not had many volunteers to be WLPOA Board members. Patrick Steininger has been our president for many years and wanted to step down. Luckily we had a couple of people volunteer to take positions on the Board and nominations from the floor were made. Dick Steininger was nominated as President and Paul Martin was nominated as Vice President. They were approved by membership. We thank them for volunteering to serve our organization!

• Committee Reports:

- o **Membership:** Anne Marie Fries reported that to-date we have 82 members.
- o Lake Environment: Marilyn Konkler reported that we did not have any successful loon nests on any of our lakes. There may have been a nest on lake 27 that was possibly destroyed by otters. There was discussion about possible trapping of destructive mammals but to date, people were only aware of beavers being trapped. There was also discussion about whether we could add loon platforms for the lake, but with some input from those with experience, we discussed that platforms are not recommended because they can be attacked by creatures and can be displaced by wind.
- There was also discussion about boating too close to shore and a reminder that in the State of Wisconsin, boats are only allowed at no-wake speeds within 100 feet of the shore. A possible new bridge on Thunderpoint Rd over the waterway between Windigo and Lake 27 was discussed.. This would be done by the Town of Bass Lake. Timing was not known.
- o **Fish and Wildlife:** Paul Martin reported that there is heavy fishing pressure on our lakes. He also reported that the DNR does not have any fish surveys planned for the rest of the year. Paul also noted that we need to get the word out to not just fish on fish cribs and dropped trees because that leads to overfishing.
- O Social: There was discussion about the Spring Dinner and possible options for next year. Trailways struggled to handle our group but ours was their first day open with their new kitchen equipment. There was discussion about giving them another chance. We also discussed other options like the Steakhouse, and the Veterans center. There are pros and cons to each option discussed. We discussed investigating different options.

Old Business:

- Decontamination Station: There was discussion that we are working on a project to
 potentially add a decontamination station to the parking lot at the Windigo boat launch.
 We are planning to apply for a DNR grant to help fund the system. We will need a
 team to work on this project.
- There were questions about the Bass Lake Fire Department from the previous year discussion. Things have calmed down since the Fire Chief changed last year.

However, fire department volunteer numbers are not as high as the Town would like.

• New Business:

O There was no new business discussed other than topics that were brought up in other parts of the meeting.

TREASURER REPORT

Below is an update on financial activity through December 31, 2023.

Member Dues Drive (as previously reported)

WLPOA's annual income from Member Dues paid in 2023 is summarized below:

- We received a total of \$4,658 in member contributions, which consisted of the following:
 - o \$2,050 in dues from members.
 - o Donations to the Fish Management Fund in the amount of \$1,189.
 - o Donations to the Invasive Species Fund in the amount of \$1,299.
 - o Donations to Friends of Windigo of \$120.
- Contributions for 2023 were higher than those received in 2022 (\$4,085).

We are grateful to all of our members for their continued support of WLPOA. Thank you!

Expenses

WLPOA had expenses for 2023 of \$2,703.61. Expenses were for the membership drive, the annual meeting/picnic, production of the newsletter, membership in the Wisconsin Lakes organization, required payments to governmental entities, administrative tasks and a refund to the DNR for an advance payment for the 2022 CWCB (Clean Water, Clean Boats) grant that we were unable to complete due to a lack of staffing for the boat landing.

Account Balances

As of December 31, 2023, WLPOA had the following account balances. The balances reflect the transfer of 2023 member donations to the Fish Management Reserve and the Invasive Species Reserve from the General Fund (Checking).

WLPOA serves property owners on Windigo Lake, Hub Lake, and Lake 27 by promoting communication and cooperation among lakeshore owners and by working with the DNR and local government to maintain lake quality and protect our lake from invasive aquatic species. LAKE ENVIRONMENT

Clean boats, Clean Waters

As Kris noted in our Treasurer report, WLPOA had previously been approved for a Clean Boats, Clean Waters grant for many years which we used to help to pay for most of our boat landing monitor costs. The landing was staffed on most weekends and holidays from fishing opener through Labor Day. We suspended our boat landing monitoring and participation in this program after we struggled getting staffing and someone to lead the program to hire and manage the boat landing monitor. If anyone is willing to voluntarily monitor our boat landing (it is an educational role to ask a few questions of people when they are launching and trailering boats) during some weekends this summer, contact us at info@windigolake.org.



Windigo Decontamination Station

Sawyer County has an ordinance regarding decontamination/wash stations at boat landings. The ordinance doesn't require the stations to be installed; however, if a decontamination station is available and stocked, it must be used to clean the vessel before entering and exiting the waterbody. Failure to use the station could result in a warning followed by fines for repeated offenses. Washburn, Bayfield, and Ashland counties have similar ordinances. According to the DNR, the main way aquatic invasive species like zebra mussels and Eurasian watermilfoil spread to new waters is often by hitching a ride on the boats and trailers of the very people who enjoy the water the most. They have also noted that lakes that have installed decontamination stations have experienced

lessened use by fishing clubs due to time challengesof taking each boat through the decontamination/wash process. A fishing club event on our lake can bring up to 19 boats to the lake in an evening.

As we previously reported, Dan Lew did some excellent preliminary research work with the DNR and the Town of Bass Lake about a potential decontamination station at the Windigo boat landing. Paul Martin joined the effort and along with Dan researched other stations on other lakes and created preliminary specifications and drawings for a hot water based decontamination station at the Windigo boat landing parking lot. Based on their work, we submitted a plan for our decontamination station and requested a grant from the Wisconsin DNR to help fund this project. This was submitted in November 2023. We did acquire approval from the Town of Bass Lake to install the system. (They own the land with the landing and parking lot.) We also acquired letters of support from neighboring lake associations and Sawyer County.

In late February, we received approval of our grant request from the Wisconsin DNR. They will fund \$19,750 toward the system. We are currently working on quantifying the ongoing costs of operating the system to make sure we have ample ongoing dollars to cover these costs. The WLPOA Board and team are working on finalizing the design and putting together the detailed project plan. Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Watch

Thanks to everyone for your continued interest and vigilance in looking for Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)! As a reminder, there are 2 major plant AIS that are prevalent in other area lakes and which we are working to keep out of Windigo: Curly Leaf Pond Weed and Eurasian Water-Milfoil.



Look for Curly Leaf Pondweed from Ice-Out through June

As soon as ice is off our lakes, it's time to look for Curly Leaf Pondweed (CLP), an underwater plant that usually grows in lake water 3 to 10 feet deep. CLP grows well in cold temperatures, even under the ice. Since it's already growing at ice-out, it can shade out smaller native plants and form dense mats that make it tough to boat or swim. When curly-leaf pondweed dies back in mid-summer, it releases nutrients that can fuel algae blooms and cause other problems. It is easily spread by boats and trailers.

More detailed pictures and instructions for how to look for Curly Leaf Pondweed and other Aquatic Invasive Species are on the AIS page on our website. Thanks for your continued vigilance.

The bad news is that Windigo Lake made the back cover of the *Outdoor News* as a featured lake for Crappies, so we can expect heavier fishing pressure, especially for the Crappies and Walleyes.

ICE OUT ON DATES

We have records of "ice-out" dates back to the 1970s from various property owners who have kept track over the years. Based on these records, this year was the earliest ice-out on record. We recorded it on March 13 because even though much of the Windigo was open water days before, there was a still a significant ice sheet on the southeast corner of the lake. The previous earliest ice-out date was March 24, which occurred in 2000 and 2012.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

<u>Clean Boats Clean Water (CBCW) Volunteer:</u> Assist the Lake Environment Board Member with managing the boat landing monitor, entering data into the DNR SWIMS database and assisting the Treasurer in administrating the annual CBCW grant.

<u>Welcome Volunteers:</u> Reach out to new property owners with information about our lakes. <u>Social Chair:</u> Coordinate the Annual Meeting/Picnic and Spring Dinner.

Loon Watch Volunteer: Monitor and gather loon sightings from people on the lakes. It is helpful to get connected with the Northland College Loon Watch program. To find out more information about the Northland College Loon Watch Program follow this link:


Spring is a always a great time for events and educational conferences in the North Woods. Here are some that may interest some of you:


WINDIGO LAKE AREA
